2016 Newbery Medal Winner

The Newbery Medal was named for eighteenth-century British bookseller John Newbery. It is awarded annually by the Association for Library Service to Children, a division of the American Library Association, to the author of the most distinguished contribution to American literature for children.

2016 Printz Award Winner

The Michael L. Printz Award is an award for a book that exemplifies literary excellence in young adult literature. This award is given jointly by ALA's children's and young adult divisions to the most distinguished audiobook for children or teens.




The War that Saved My Life

2016 Sibert Award Winner

The Robert F. Sibert Informational Book Award is awarded annually to the author(s) and illustrator(s) of the most distinguished informational book published in English during the preceding year. The award is named in honor of Robert F. Sibert, the long-time President of Bound to Stay Bound Books, Inc. of Jacksonville, Illinois. ALSC administers the award.

The William C. Morris Award honors the accomplishments of a first-time author whose debut book has made an impact in young adult literature. This award was given for the first time in 2009.





2016 Pura Belpré Award

The Pura Belpré Award is given to a Latino/Latina author and illustrator to recognize their literary or artistic talent and their efforts to portray the Latino culture. The award was named in honor of the first Latina librarian at the New York City Public Library, Pura Belpré.

2015 National Book Award, Young People's Literature Winner

The National Book Award for Young People's Literature is given to the best book by an American citizen, published in the United States from December 1 of the previous year to November 30 of the current year. Books are nominated by their publishers, and selected by a 5-member jury.

Alex Awards

The Alex Awards are given to ten books written for adults that have special appeal to young adults, ages 12 through 18. The winning titles are selected from the previous year's publishing.

The Children's and Young Adult Bloggers' Literary Awards (The Cybils)

Cybils are awarded based merit and popularity. Awards are given in seven categories: Picture Books; Non-fiction Picture Books; Middle Grade fiction; Poetry; Young Adult fiction; Non-fiction (YA/MG); and Graphic Novels.

This list is primarily intended for students in grades 9-12 who wish to 1) enrich and strengthen their knowledge of various subject areas in both classic and contemporary literature, 2) round out their reading before entering college; and 3) prepare for college entrance exams.
